Admission Requirements

To be eligible for the program you must be:

- Meet minimal admissions requirements
- Include two/three letters of recommendations
- SELECT "YES" TO QUESTION under Enrollment Preference ON THE WORCESTER STATE
 APPLICATION that reads: "Would you like to be considered for the Alternatives Individual
 Development Program."

Space is limited and offered on a first come first serve basis.

Alternatives for Individual Development Program (A.I.D.)

The Alternatives for Individual Development Program (A.I.D.) is an educational assistance program for students who may require support services in order to succeed in college. Included in this category are students who identify as first generation, economically diverse, and/or ALANA/BIPOC.

Summer Program

Participation begins with an intensive six-week Summer Academy (June/July) in preparation for Fall enrollment. Courses and Workshops covered over the summer include International & Comparative Education, English, Math and Verbal skills. Students have an opportunity to gain 3-12 college credits during the summer program to count towards their graduation requirements.
