Visual and Performing Arts at Worcester State University

In 2009, as its liberal arts and sciences curriculum was expanding, Worcester State University launched one of the few interdisciplinary visual and performing arts majors in the United States. Designed as a model for interdisciplinary study, the major allows students to concentrate in art, music, or theatre, while gaining knowledge of how the arts interact.

Worcester State University's commitment to the arts has made it a vital member of Worcester's arts community. Led by devoted and inventive faculty of the **Visual and Performing Arts Department**, the talents and creativity of the students are showcased in the Mary Cosgrove Dolphin Gallery, Worcester State Theatre productions held in the state-of-the-art Fuller Theater, and Worcester State University Chorale and music ensembles throughout greater Worcester—and the world.

Worcester Center for Crafts

The Worcester Center for Crafts. located on Sagamore Road in Worcester, is New England's leading crafts education center and the oldest crafts center in the United States. It offers classes in ceramics, enameling, jewelry, ironwork, blown glass, flamework, photography, and more to the greater Worcester community. Its Krikorian Gallery, Gallery Store, and events attract thousands of patrons interested in the exceptional creativity of locally, regionally, and nationally known artists and artisans. More than 600 community members—primarily adults—take an average of 170 community classes and workshops annually.

In 2009, when the Center faced an uncertain future, it established an affiliation with Worcester State University and Worcester State Foundation. The University moved many visual arts and music classes there. A craft certificate program for professional arts educators offered by Worcester State's Center for Effective Instruction operates at the Center.

The Center has introduced crafts education to select Worcester
State initiatives, such as the Latino Education Institute. It also provides internship opportunities for Worcester State students in majors ranging from visual and performing arts to business.







Worcester Art Museum

In 2012, Worcester State established an exciting new partnership with the acclaimed Worcester Art Museum. Through a number of innovative courses that draw on the museum's resources, Worcester State students gain valuable knowledge and build solid career skills in disciplines as diverse as art, computer science, psychology, and physics. They support the museum's initiatives to engage audiences in new ways.

Special access to the museum provides students with an alternative laboratory full of history, new possibilities for deeper learning, and opportunities to test the boundaries of art and artistic exploration. Students find that there is more than art on

display; computer programming, statistics, sign language, human behavior, interactive art, and patron participation also play a role in optimal museum operations.

A relationship forged by WSU
President Barry M. Maloney and
WAM Director Matthias Waschek,
this endeavor encourages close
cooperation between the museum's
education team and Worcester State
faculty. The results have already
exceeded their expectations. The
future promises to be as unlimited
as the imaginations and creativity
of Worcester State's faculty and
students.



Worcester State University at a glance

Worcester State University's 58-acre campus is nestled in the residential northwest side of Worcester—the second largest city in New England—home to 35,000 college students at more than a dozen colleges and universities. Hanover Theatre for the Performing Arts

For Worcester State University alumni Paul Demoga '67 and Edward Madaus, M.Ed. '72, the 2008 opening of the historic Hanover Theatre for the Performing Arts fulfilled their dream to open a local venue for Broadway shows and contribute to the redevelopment of Worcester's downtown. They tapped Worcester's pool of professionals and arts supporters, and secured financial commitments from city, state and federal agencies as well as local foundations and corporations, including Hanover Insurance Group, to renovate the grandiose Franklin Square Theatre for the third time since 1904. Just as they envisioned, the theatre attracts over 170,000 annual patrons to Broadway shows, concerts, comedians and more, earning it recognition by Pollstar as one of the world's top 50 theatres.
