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A Message from the President



In fall of 2023, Worcester State University tied for the largest incoming class of new students, rebounding from the pandemic-era's downward enrollment trend. It was gratifying to see the RASE Plan paying off, with 65 percent of our accepted students indicating that the MajorPlus academic framework was a factor in their decision to attend Worcester State. Our admissions process changes – like joining the Common App and maintaining our SAToptional status – also helped enrollment rebound. As the FactBook reveals, we are also growing in diversity, with 43 percent of those incoming new students identifying as African, Latiné, Asian, Native American/Black, Indigenous and/or People of Color.

These are positive trends we can all take credit for in some way – whether your job is keeping the grounds looking beautiful, handling our payroll, raising funds, keeping Blackboard up and running, or advising, counseling, or teaching students.

Our financials remind us that 2023's class of new students and improving our persistence rate have not made up for the dramatic enrollment drop we experienced between 2017 and 2022. Yet we do have validation – echoed by NECHE's 10-year reaccreditation – that the way we've addressed challenges is working. We've planned for trends we could predict, like the coming demographic decline among 18-to-22-year-olds, and we've used a broad-based, problem-solving approach to address unpredictable events, like the pandemic. We're now developing a culture of continuous improvement that can help us more readily address challenges as they arise, refining this model of success.

As we head into our 150th year, we'll maintain our focus on the 2020-2027 strategic plan, "Beyond 150," which was extended two years to account for its initiation at the height of the pandemic. We've incorporated measurements of progress toward goals, and that progress is reported annually, knowing that "assessment" is something NECHE will reconsider in a few years. I encourage all to familiarize yourselves with those goals and the metrics we're using to achieve them, as well as the data found in this year's Factbook.

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

A Brief Timeline of Worcester State University

Worcester State University was founded as the Worcester State Normal School in 1874, the fifth state funded normal school in Massachusetts, and one of the dozens of teacher-training schools established during the 19th century.

In 1932, all the normal schools were renamed, and Worcester became Worcester State Teachers College. That same year, the University moved to its present location on Chandler Street. A large, colonial-style building was constructed on the site of Willow Farm, owned by Worcester inventor and philanthropist George I. Rockwood.

In 1942, Rockwood donated an additional 35 acres, paving the way for campus expansion. The University's fifth president, Dr. Eugene A. Sullivan (1947-1970), oversaw a period of unprecedented growth, as enrollment grew from 150 students, all pursuing education degrees, to nearly 2,800 students pursuing a variety of degrees.

By 1963, the former teachers' college had evolved into a liberal arts and sciences college, and the Board of Education renamed it Worcester State College. Under the leadership of Dr. Robert E. Leestamper (1970-1975), the University opened its first residence hall, Chandler Village. In 1974, the University established the Graduate School.

The growth period continued under the administration of **President Joseph J. Orze** (1975-1982). In 1978, the Student Center opened. The University added its second residence hall, Dowden Hall, named for Mrs. Vera M. (Dowden) Baldwin '34, M.Ed. '53, the school's first Dean of Students in 1979.

Under the leadership of President Philip D. Vairo (1982-1991), the University expanded its programs to include the area's first M.S. in speech-language pathology, and the first bachelor's degree in occupational therapy in the state college system.

During the presidency of Dr. Kaylan K. Ghosh (1992-2002), the University incorporated the widespread use of technology, from computer-based learning to a campus-wide network. In 2000, the University opened the 110,000-square-foot Ghosh Center for Science and Technology, with instructional laboratories for 12 academic programs and a 196-seat multimedia lecture hall. Dr. Ghosh also launched the Worcester State Foundation as a 501(c)3 non-profit organization in 1994.

In 2002, the University welcomed its first female president, Dr. Janelle C. Ashley (2002-2011). Under her leadership, the student population grew, as the campus undertook major renovations and building projects, including the construction of the award-winning Wasylean Residence Hall, named after philanthropist Phillip. M. Wasylean II '63, which opened in 2004.

In 2010, the Commonwealth of Massachusetts granted university status to all nine state colleges, renaming the institution to Worcester State University. In July, 2011, Barry M. Maloney became the 11th president of the University. Under his leadership, Worcester State University has increased its full-time faculty, increased fundraising, and improved measures of student success.

Student opportunities for civic engagement, service learning, and experiential learning have grown substantially. In 2015, Sheehan Hall, a new 400-bed residence hall, named for the Lt. Col. James F. Sheehan '55 opened. In 2016 a state-of-the-art athletic and recreation facility opened and was renamed the Gene J. and Julianne DeFeudis Wellness Center in 2023.

Worcester State University is accredited by the New England Commission of Higher Education (NECHE). NECHE is the regional accreditation agency for colleges and universities in the six New England states: Connecticut, Maine, Massachusetts, New Hampshire, Rhode Island, and Vermont. Three institutions in Greece, three in Switzerland, two in Lebanon, and one in Bermuda, Bulgaria, and Morocco, respectively, are also affiliated with NECHE.

Accreditation is an expression of confidence in the institution's purposes, performances, and human and financial resources. The goals are effectiveness, improvement, and public assurance. Unlike popular magazines, this does not involved ranking institutions, but rather establishes a level of acceptable quality for all accredited institutions, while respecting the unique missions of the institutions involved.

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
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

Longitudinal Enrollment by Status








Fall 2023 Enrollment by Status and Classification





Fall 2023 Enrollment by Housing Type








Fall 2023 Enrollment by Sex








Fall 2023 Enrollment by Race/Ethnicity









Longitudinal Acceptance and Yield Rates






Fall 2023 High School GPA






Fall 2023 Verbal SAT Scores





Fall 2023 Enrollment by Housing Type








Fall 2023 Enrollment by Sex










Longitudinal Acceptance and Yield Rates





Fall 2023 Enrollment by Housing Type








Fall 2023 Enrollment by Tuition Residency






Fall 2023 Enrollment by Sex






Fall 2023 Enrollment by Race/Ethnicity








Fall 2023 Enrollment by Tuition Residency






Fall 2023 Enrollment by Sex





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






